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

Datum Marine Services will be offering Captain's Bootcamp in hitaću from August 19 to 23 and August 26 to 30. This 10 day bootcamp includes SVOP, MEDA3/SDVBS, ROCM (marine radio) and offers practical training sessions on docking, anchoring, person over board, chartwork, pilotage, electronic GPS navigation, search and rescue, and big wave boat handling strategies.

Open burning prohibition effective Friday, July 12 at 12:00pm.

All open fires, including Category 1 campfires of any size, will be prohibited in the Coastal Fire Centre beginning on Friday, July 12, 2024, at 12:00pm.

This fire ban includes use of fireworks, sky lanterns, burn barrels/cages, binary exploding targets, air curtain burners, tiki and similar torches, and chimineas. Use of outdoor stoves is not prohibited. Learn more about what is allowed by inserting the below url into your web browser.


The ban will be in effect until Thursday, October 31, 2024, at 12:00pm, or until wildfire risk conditions allow the ban to be lifted. These fire bans are in place to reduce the risk of wildfires caused by humans and protect our lands.

If a local fire is suspected in Ucluelet, the public is encouraged to report any witnessed outdoor burning. Contact the District of Ucluelet Municipal Office Monday to Friday, 8:30am to 4:00pm at (250) 726-7744.

For all other concerns in hitaću or on TSL contact Yuułu?ił?atḥ Government from Monday to Friday 8:00am to 4:30pm at (250) 726-7342.

After hours, call 9-1-1 and request the fire department duty officer to attend. Before reporting a fire, please take the time to confirm if the flame is from an approved propane appliance. To report a wildfire or irresponsible actions that might start a wildfire in British Columbia, call *5555.

Clifford George's cixwatin

Eagle carving to watch over Pacific Rim National Park Reserve.

A powerful carving has been unveiled to welcome and watch over visitors to the Yuułu?ił?atḥ traditional territories within the Pacific Rim National Park Reserve.

The totem was carved by renowned artist Clifford George through a collaboration between Parks Canada and the Elders Working Group with Yuułu?ił?atḥ elders choosing a ċixwatin, eagle, to be placed within their territory at the Park Reserve's southern border.

"The way I saw it in my mind is just the way it is as you see it," George told the Westerly News after a June 28 unveiling celebration. "I was looking forward to this day. I'm so happy that they chose me to do the pole for them. Today is a really exciting day."

Yuułu?ił?atḥ Government's Director of Culture, Language

and Heritage, Carey Cunneyworth, told the Westerly that the cix^watin was chosen because of its ability to watch over everyone.

"The eagle flies above with great sight. It sees all and it's the being that can see everything. It's observing every one of us when it flies up high and it watches everybody passing in and out of the Park Reserve protecting everybody," Cunneyworth said.

The Park Reserve's superintendent Dave Tovell told the Westerly that the Elders Working Group had provided a myriad of advice throughout the construction of the recently completed ?apsčiik tašii multi-use path that spans the 25 kilometres between the Park Reserve's southern and northern borders. Through the group, Tla-o-qui-aht and Yuułu?ił?ath elders collaborated on the commemoration of both Nations through carved monuments that reflect the connection between the two communities and the Park Reserve, according to Tovell.

"They gave the direction that it shouldn't be a Parks led commemoration piece, it should be Indigenous led," he said. "Parks Canada came up with the mechanisms to provide funding to both Yuułu?ił?atḥ and Tla-o-qui-aht to do what they wanted to do in their territory to represent what they wanted to represent...The Elders Working Group really gave this whole project direction and guidance on how to work together in a good way."

He noted that Tla-o-qui-aht carver Joe Martin had carved the stunning wolves located near Incinerator Rock on the other end of the Park Reserve within the Tla-o-qui-aht's traditional territories

"It's a nice match to Clifford's and Joe's work and the connection of the two Nations," he said. "We're super proud of the relationship between the Yuułu?ił?atḥ Government, Tla-o-qui-aht First Nation and Parks Canada and how this project has kind of tied it and created a closer relationship between the three governments."

He added George's cixwatin was placed to be seen by all the drivers, cyclists and pedestrians heading into the Park Reserve to raise awareness of whose traditional territories they're in.

"That awareness is extremely important and that they can

show ?iisaak, which is respect in Nuu-chah-nulth and that they're aware that it's not just a National Park Reserve but the traditional territories of the Yuułu?ił?atḥ," he said. "It's amazing...To see the finished product out here has absolutely been incredible."

Yuułu?ił?atḥ Government President Charles McCarthy opened the celebration by welcoming the audience to the Nation's territory and said the ċixwatin would watch over all within it.

"I raise my hands up to Clifford. It's been a long time coming and I know there's been difficulties throughout getting

things to this point. I want to acknowledge Clifford for his effort. He's always been one to stand up and do things for the community," McCarthy said. "He's always been there to lift us up with his art and this is reflective of what is in all our hearts as Yuułu?ił?ath."

Cunneyworth served as the MC for the unveiling and thanked those who came to celebrate the new carving.

"There was a lot of back and forth and quite a few barriers, but we got through it and this is the evidence of doing it in a good way," he said. "Really, truly thank you all for coming out to witness this. I'm so happy to see it up here."

Warriors Games

Warriors games, another outstanding success!

One of the best Warriors Games yet took place in hitaću from May 24 to 26, and coordinator Jason Sam says the axe throwing competition stood above the rest.

The fourth annual event featured 65 young men competing from the Yuułu?ił?atḥ, Huu-ay-aht, Clayoquot, Toquaht, Tlao-qui-aht and Ditidaht Nations.

"The highlight of the weekend was our axe throwing competition," says Jason, the Community Coordinator for the Warriors program. "All of our Nations compete regardless of age, and it was the two youngest kids that were in the axe throwing finals. They were no older than 8 years old, and they beat out 16 and 17 year-old boys.

"The competition was over three rounds, so they had to win a round, win another round, and then win a round again," he adds. "It was so amazing to see these young boys win. Everybody was cheering. It was amazing."

The team from Huu-ay-aht won the Warriors Games, which featured archery, sling shots, wood chopping and log balancing besides axe throwing. It also included an event called the Warriors Run.

The Warriors Run was another important feature of the games.

"It was epic," Jason recalls. "Usually they do a forest run. Last year it was pretty much a flat out run in the forest through a campground and sand and back up. It was relatively easy. This year we wanted to challenge the youth, so we kept the forest run pretty hard and we only cleared anything dangerous out of the way. They had to run a loop starting from the fire area, and they had to get a small bucket of water and had to run back with it. It was pretty cool."

"All of the events were amazing and 100 percent well attended," Jason states.

The location for the Warriors Games changes each year and all participating Nations are invited to apply to host the event.

They rotate locations every year. It gets posted out each nation as to who wants to host. "Yuułu?ił?atḥ hosted the youth leader gathering this year in February, which was the most successful meeting ever," Jason says.

The event took place in the Warriors training area in hitaću.

"Initially, the Warriors had built a trail to the lake within our traditional area, and we started to use for training for Warriors games because the young men were interested in developing their skills.

"We have two archery ranges, a space for axe throwing, one for sling shot practice, a camp fire area and wood chopping area, and we've added a log balancing area," he states. "We're working on camping spots.

"It's kind of like a circuit, where they can go from short archery range for beginners to the axe throw, to long archery range for advanced archers, to sling shots, to chopping wood, to fire building and log balance," he adds. "It's all in our safe area, a place where we can sit and relax and enjoy food. We've lined the safe areas with smaller trees that have fallen, and created areas where people can train and walk in a safe area without walking through a crossbow range, or where axe throwing is taking place."

Jason, who has been working for the Clayoquot Biosphere Trust for the past three years, started volunteering with the Warriors program several years ago.

"I knew all of the boys from when I used to work at the (Ucluelet) High School, so I've known them all from when they were little, tiny kids until now," he notes. "They were asking me to join in and I couldn't for the longest time because I was involved in other volunteer things, like Search and Rescue and Surf Riders. It took a while to get here, but it's been amazing working with the Warriors."

While Jason coordinated the Warriors event, he had plenty of help from his team along with Ricardo, Julia, Monique and other volunteers. What pleased him about everything was "just how the event went, as well as the cultural support that the community provided."
